War on drugs: no scientific
reasons explain why
Cannabis should be
classified between the most
dangerous substances for
the public health.





No division between
"soft" and "hard"
drugs is a political,
ethical and moral
conception of
drugs.





War on drugs:

The reasons are political and concentrate on the interests of the global powers, where a majority of consumers live.





- The Vienna Consensus:
- "A world free of drugs, yes we can" (UNGASS 1998).

 passed in 1974, the
 consumption of
 cannabis has never
 been threatened with
 punishment.







Cannabis is the most consumed drug

in Uruguay with almost 160.000 users



- Regulation of Cannabis Market:
- When: December 2013:
- What: law 19172
- Why: 1. to control the cannabis market
- 2. to reduce the risks for users
- 3. to fight against the illegal market







- 1. domestic-growing (up to 6female plants in flower)
- 2. membership of a cannabis club (up to 45 members with 99 female plants in flower)

Three ways of access:

3. buying cannabis produced by licenced producers in pharmacies



So far are registered:

5.000 self-growers

 20 cannabis clubs (15 are in the registration process)

Users muss be registered

Almost 50% of the 160.000
cannabis users have
intention to access the
product in the pharmacies



Institute of Cannabis Regulation and Control

- It has the control of the regulated market
- It issues the licences for producers
- It punishes the abuse of regulated system






Has Uruguay really been
